Men and Cartoons by Jonathan Lethem (Faber, £10.99). Tap into your inner superhero with these spooky short stories.

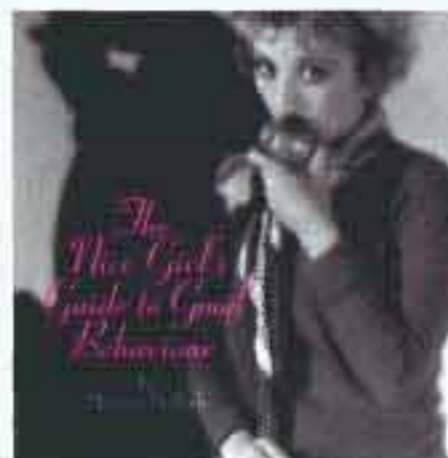
Ten Men by Alexandra Gray (Atlantic, £6.99). A wicked whisper
